SBRI was founded as a non-profit membership organization on Oct. 13, 1960, through the efforts of Herci & Myles Marsden and a group of 60 Rhode Islanders. For over a half-century, SBRI has earned a prestigious reputation and is recognized as an outstanding cultural asset to RI. This is part of the responsibility of a civic, regional ballet company; to provide its community with high-quality dance performances while educating audiences and training dancers and artists. A pre-professional ballet company must reach communities and populations that may not be served by professional companies. SBRI audiences gain knowledge and an appreciation of classical ballet, music, and art. 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

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## The State Ballet of Rhode Island's Historic "Pointes"

The State Ballet of Rhode Island (SBRI) was founded in 1960 through the efforts of Herci and Myles Marsden and a group of sixty enthusiastic Rhode Islanders. It has come to serve as a creative outlet for composers, musicians, writers, painters, lighting technicians, costume designers, and choreographers, as well as dancers.



#### 1960's—

- November 19, 1960 SBRI has its premiere performance in Rhode Island at Veterans Memorial Auditorium.
- Coppélia has its premiere in Rhode Island in 1962 before an enthusiastic crowd.
- SBRI represents RI several times at the New York World's Fair and Eastern States Expositions.
- In the interest of cultural exchange, SBRI receives a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts and Humanities to invite Croatian choreographer/dancer Oskar Harmos to assist SBRI in staging the first American production of *Stranger* (1968).
- Isobel Harris Sheppard composes Ballet from Another Planet for SBRI. First performance is on the ocean rocks in Turnberry, Narragansett (August 1965).
- George Hirst, a Rhode Island composer, writes *Marche* for Herci Marsden, SBRI.
- SBRI dances at the State House's annual observances of Lincoln's Birthday in the 1960's.
- At the annual University of Rhode Island Arts Festival, SBRI performs *Destiny* on April 27, 1965 in Kingston, RI.
- For the first time in Rhode Island, SBRI performs *Giselle* to an overflowing audience at Veterans Memorial Auditorium (1964). World-famous Anton Dolin is guest choreographer and also plays Hilarion in the production.
- Capacity audiences see SBRI perform at the Diamond Hill Music Festivals, beginning in 1965.
- SBRI performs *Destiny* at the first Performing Arts Festival with the Rhode Island Philharmonic Orchestra in 1967.
- SBRI performances are featured at many civic events, including the State House Rotunda and at the 325th Anniversary of the City of Providence at Brown Stadium.
- In 1969, SBRI participates in the filming of a television show for Channel 36 at Rhode Island College.



- Over the decade, SBRI introduces to Rhode Islanders such giants in its traditional repertoire, such as *Giselle*, *Coppélia*, *Romeo and Juliet*, *Cinderella*, and *The Sleeping Beauty*. Guest choreographers Anton Dolin, Oskar Harmos, Joseph Levinhoff, and Mia Slavenska interpret their work, supervise rehearsals, and lend their presence on the stage. Harmos performs the role of the Stranger in his ballet *Stranac*, and Dolin appears as King Claudius in *Hamlet* and Hilarion in *Giselle*.
- SBRI performs *Faust*, *Aida*, *Merry Widow*, *La Traviata*, and *Carmen* with Providence's Opera Theatre and performs with the Rhode Island Civic Chorale and Orchestra in the production of *Carmina Burana*.
- The Company of 57 packs its costumes, scenery, and equipment and travels to Croatia, by invitation from the Croatian government (1970).
- Guest choreographer and Artistic Advisor for The State Ballet, Sir Anton Dolin, and John Gilpin, London Festival Ballet, choreograph the famous *Pas de Quatre* for SBRI. It premiered in 1976.











- The full-length story ballet *Sylvia The Nymph of Diana* is performed for the first time in the United States, choreographed by SBRI's Artistic Director, Herci Marsden.
- In front of sold-out crowds, SBRI performs several short works at Bryant College's 125th Anniversary Celebration.
- As guests of RI School of Design in 1989, SBRI performs at the RISD Museum's, An Informal History
  of Dance in Rhode Island, presenting several short ballet works with commendable performances.

#### 1990's—

- SBRI is commissioned by the South County Center for the Arts to perform the full length story ballet *Coppélia* at South Kingstown High School in February 1990. The performance is a sold-out crowd pleaser. The company is asked to return the following year for another successful performance.
- Margaret Buechner, a composer from Michigan, commissions Herci Marsden to choreograph the World Premiere Fairy Tale Ballet *Phantomgreen*, based on the Hans Christian Andersen story *The Princess and the Pea*. Ms. Buechner writes this original story, music, and libretto. A compact disc of *Phantomgreen* is currently available in the United States and Europe. Two of SBRI's principal dancers appear on the cover of the compact disc. An insert that accompanies the disc states that choreographer, Herci Marsden, premiered *Phantomgreen* and it is performed by SBRI.
- In November 1991, the Student Activities Office of the University of Rhode Island invites SBRI and Artistic Director, Herci Marsden, to perform the full length classic *Giselle*. The event was sold out.
- On July 27, 1995, SBRI appointed Artistic Associate and member of the New York City Ballet, Richard Anton Marsden, to return to his hometown theater Veteran's Memorial Auditorium in Providence, RI, where he received standing ovations for his performance. This event, sponsored in part by SBRI, was a celebration of pride, support, and a Marsden Family success story.
- On August 3, 1995, Ms. Marsden, along with other SBRI members appears on ABC's *Good Morning America*.
- On May 10, 1996, SBRI members perform the RI premiere of *Two's Company*, a ballet directed and choreographed by Toni Pimble, Artistic Director of the Eugene Ballet Company, Oregon.
- SBRI's annually performs and visits at Hasbro Children's Hospital in Providence, RI bringing well-known fairytale characters to life. The experiences are rewarding and meaningful for the dancers, the young patients and their families.
- Citizen's Bank proudly sponsors several of SBRI's Project Ballet in Education Cultural Enrichment Performances children performances.
- SBRI premieres of *Ballet Ireland* and *La Esmeralda* in spring of 1999.

















2010's—

- SBRI performs at events such as 'The Festival of Giving,' the Town of Lincoln's 'Festival of Lights,' and The Lincoln Mall's Holiday Celebrations.
- SBRI Alumna Principal Dancer and Executive Director, Ana Marsden Fox, premieres her choreographed, eclectic ballet, "Les Pieds."
- SBRI is filmed by National Geographic for its TV series, Jellyfish, aired on PBS, 2001.
- 41st Season of The State Ballet opens with premiere of *Ballet Espagnol*.
- SBRI annually participates in the RI Health and Fitness Expo at the RI Convention Center, demonstrating healthy lifestyles and positive community involvement.
- SBRI performs at the annual Robert Mondavi Festival of the Vine WaterFire events, *On the Corner of Art and Vine*, at WaterPlace Park.
- In June 2003, SBRI hosts its first *Partner with the Arts*, which welcomes business & community leaders to explore opportunities with SBRI.
- SBRI performs at Trinity Repertory Company's *Holiday Open House* in December of 2003, and *Ballet West & Les Bras* premierse in May of 2004, created by Ana Marsden Fox.
- RI premieres of Cherokee, Boys Will Be Boys, and Goddesses of the Vine in May, 2005.
- Summertime, a solo variation danced to music from the opera, *Porgy and Bess*, is premiered by resident choreographer and SBRI alumna, Shana Fox. The piece marked the choreographer's official launch as a SBRI resident choreographer.
- SBRI hosts its 5th annualPWTA event on the outdoor stage at SBRI's grounds, and performs with Mike Lyons and The Blue Moon Orchestra.
- *Coppélia* is honored with a Motif Magazine Theatre Award 'Recognized for Excellence in the 2008 Motif Theatre Awards readers poll & voted Best Dance Production.'
- In May 2008, *Gansel and Hetal* is premiered by Ana Marsden Fox, and a revival of *Claire de Lune* is created by Mia Nocera Godbout.
- The 2008-2009 season began with a revival of SBRI's Project e Pea), Ballet Coffee Hour *From Studio to Stage*, a four-series, family-friendly event of how a ballet is created including music, lecture and a visual performance.
- Mark Marsden, Mia Nocera Godbout, and Shana Fox collaborate to produce an electrifying world premiere ballet, *Gracefully Gershwin*, funded partially by a RISCA grant.
- *Coppélia* is named 'The Professional Semi-Pro Best Dance Production' during the 2009 Motif Theatre Awards readers' poll.












- SBRI officially opened its 50th Season with Rhode Island's holiday tradition, *Coppélia*. For its Spring Performance, The State Ballet performed the monumental classical ballet, *Giselle* to feature appearances by numerous alumni dancers from over the Company's 50 years in existence!
- On June 6, 2010, SBRI is honored at their Golden Anniversary Gala surrounded by five decades of alumni, patrons, and guests.
- In October of 2010, SBRI performed the opening ceremonies, by invitation, for the Gloria Gemma Breast Cancer Research Foundation's *Flames of Hope* event in front of a Providence, RI crowd of thousands. Two new pieces, 'My Heart Will Go On' and 'Lift Me Up' make their emotional debut. For the last ten years, with Shana Fox as choreographer, this annual community event continues with several premiers.
- The spring 2011 performances of Artists in Motion features the premiere of *Petra and the Vuk*, choreographed by Ana Marsden Fox. A Croatian twist on the traditional story of *Peter and the Wolf* delights audiences of all ages and ethnic backgrounds.
- Herci Marsden's 1982 premiere of *Impressions of the Sky* is resurrected & restaged by Marsden's granddaughter and SBRI Resident Choreographer, Shana Fox Marceau. Incorporating the majority of the original theme, steps, and Goldsmith musical score, Fox refreshes the piece with added music of Frank Zappa and twists of *Mother Nature's Imagination*.
- Herci Marsden's staging of *Pictures at an Exhibition* as the 3rd act of Artists in Motion 2011 sparks a trilogy of art forms that incorporate nearly 200 RI artists. The Company's performance is fused with its first *Artist Exchange* where over 110 visual artists interpret the music, storyline and movement creating a gallery full of 2-dimensional artwork. RI Composer and musician, George Leonard, is highlighted as a guest artist when he portrays the acting role of Mussorgsky during the performances.
- SBRI Principal Dancer, Holly Fusco, is voted RI's 2011 'Leading Female Dancer of the Year' by Motif Magazine.
- Throughout SBRI's 52nd Season, the company teamed up with New England children's author, David Ira Rottenberg, for multiple performances of *Gwendolyn the Graceful Pig*, a narrated ballet that fuses reading and ballet. SBRI's performances are choreographed by its resident choreographer, Mia Godbout, also a full-time children's reading specialist.
- In spring of 2012, Motif Magazine awards SBRI's Coppélia as 2012 Holiday Dance Production of the Year.
- In May 2012, the one-act ballet *Safari* takes the stage, marking a world premiere of music and dance a collaboration between SBRI's choreographer Mia Godbout and Rhode Island Modern Music Project's composer Christy Isles.
- SBRI welcomes alumni dancer Corey Bourbonniere back to Rhode Island for his Hometown Debut performance as a professional ballet dancer with Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre. Corey performs with SBRI in Herci Marsden's, *Giselle*, in March 2013, and is currently a Pittsburg Ballet Theatre soloist 2019.
- In April of 2013, SBRI was voted 'Reader's Pick Best Dance Company' by The Providence Phoenix Magazine.
- In May 2013, SBRI Resident Choreographer, Shana Fox, collaborates with RI composer, Noreen Inglesi, to create the world premiere ballet, *Dance of the Firefly* which debuted on the Company's outdoor stage during the annual *Wine Tasting Soiree* in front of a sold out crowd. It was voted Dance Production of the Year by Motif Magazine.









Historic Points cont.

- SBRI's Principal Dancer, Mark Marsden, is voted RI's 2013 'Principal Dancer of the Year' by Motif Magazine. Also nominated was his partner, Principal Dancer Peg Chobanian.
- In March 2014, choreographer Mark Marsden premiers his ballet *Train*. In collaboration with the music of RI's composer Noreen Inglesi. Ana Marsden premiers *Hegnar & Buck*.
- SBRI celebrates it's Emerald Season in 2014-2015 and premiered the large-scale, full length production *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, and won Motif Magazine's 'Production of the Year' Award.
- On June 12th, 2015 SBRI collborates with Paul M. Coté and The Vernal Arts and Music Festival to produce *Lest We Forget* to benefit the Alzheimer's Associaion. Mr. Coté and SBRI continue community ollaborations to support the Alzheimer's Association.
- With the Gloria Gemma Breast Cancer Resource Foundation, SBRI performs at the RI Flower & Garden Show Preview Party as living statues from the ballet *Giselle*.
- In the summer of 2016, SBRI's Principal Dancer, Kimberly Najjar, is voted 'Principal Dancer of the Year' and Herci Marsden's *Giselle* is voted 'Production of the Year'.
- SBRI opens its 57th Season with a celebratory transition to the historic Park Theatre in Cranston, RI.
- SBRI performs Herci Marsden's *Phantomgreen* for their Spring Ballet, in addition to *Ballet of the Clowns*, *Esmeralda*, *Claire de Lune*, and new ballets *Company of Three* and *Deco*.
- SBRI and Paul M. Coté collaborate for the 2017 Food and Wine Tasting
- In March 2018, SBRI performs *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland*, a Rhode Island premier.
- In March 2019, SBRI premiers *A Tale of Twelve Dancing Princess*, and *The Colors of Love and Ligh*t, which won Motif Magazine's 2019 Performance of the Year, for choreographers Lori Broess and Shana Fox, with artist Paul M. Coté, a stage collaboration.
- SBRI joins the Providence Singers and the Rhode Island Philarmonic in a performance of Whitbourn's *Luminosity*.

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## Herci Marsden

## PRIMA BALLERINA, ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Born in Omis, near Split, Croatia, Herci Munitic began dancing at age five with the Children's Theater of Split, Croatia. She made her debut at thirteen with the National Theater in Split. Throughout her years of training, she has such notable mentors as Mila Katic, Ana Roje, Oskar Harmoš, and Mia Slavenska.

In 1958, Ms. Marsden immigrated to the United States to live in Lincoln, Rhode Island where she co-founded the Brae Crest School of Ballet. As Prima Ballerina, Herci Marsden made her American debut in 1960 with The State Ballet of Rhode Island - the repertory company she was instrumental in establishing.

While balancing her active careers with The Brae Crest School and The State Ballet, Ms. Marsden was a leading dancer at the New YorkWorld's Fair and Eastern States Exposition and the St. Louis Municipal Opera. She performed the leading role in *Destiny* at the First Performing Arts Festival with the Rhode Island Philharmonic Orchestra in 1967. She also danced in *Faust*, *Aida*, and *Carmen* with the Providence Opera Theater, and danced



with the Rhode Island Civic Chorale and Orchestra in the production of *Carmina Burana*. By invitation of the Yugoslavian government, the Marsdens led the 57 members of The State Ballet of Rhode Island to tour Croatia in 1970.

In 1966, Herci & Myles Marsden introduced classical ballet at The University of Rhode Island, College of Human Science & Services, Department of Physical Education Health & Recreation. URI was the first university in Rhode Island to introduce classical ballet into its program as a credited course, and Ms. Marsden instructed there for nearly 30 years. More of Ms. Marsden's recent accomplishments are: in the spring of 1990, Ms. Marsden was commissioned to choreograph the World Premiere Fairy Tale Ballet, Phantomgreen, written and composed by Margaret Buechner, a composer from Michigan; in April of 1991; Ms. Marsden was a panelist at URI's 'Women in Leadership in the 1990's; Ms. Marsden's biographical sketch has been written in Marquis' Who's Who in the East, Who's Who in Entertainment, and Who's Who of American Women, for individuals who have demonstrated outstanding achievement in their field of endeavor and who have contributed significantly to the betterment of contemporary society; she was awarded the 1998 Commemorative Medal in recognition of her selection as Woman of the Year for outstanding community and professional achievement from The American Biographical Institute; she was the recipient of the 2008 Encore Award from the Arts & Business Council of RI's 'Individual Achievement Award for the Performing Arts'; she received Motif Magazine's '2010 Artistic Vision Award' for her half-century of artistic excellence & growth of the Arts.



Ms. Marsden has been an integral part of SBRI since its inception, not only as Prima Ballerina but also notably as a choreographer, and since 1976, as Artistic Director. Edwin Safford, the long-time critic for The Providence Journal, described her versatility: "As choreographer, and Artistic Director, too, she displayed an undeniable authority over the company."

Best known as a dancer, the leading roles for which Herci Marsden are most celebrated are Giselle (Giselle) - of which her interpretation has been termed "A perfectly splendid 'Giselle" by Bradford Swan, and "Her 'Giselle' had heart and soul" by Charles Leach in The Pawtucket Times, as well as Swanhilda (Coppélia) of which "Herci Marsden's portrayal of the role (is) saucy, knowingly comedic and as complete a characterization as you will find", critiques Edwin Safford as well as Charles Leach who viewed "Herci's 'Swanhilda'...a living portrait...her dancing was immaculate." Among some of her other memorable roles are Juliet (Romeo and Juliet), Ivana and Snake in which Ms. Marsden played dual roles (Stranac), Taglioni (Pas de Quatre), Baba Jaga (Pictures at an Exhibition), Princess Aurora (The Sleeping Beauty), Cinderella (Cinderella), Ophelia (Hamlet), and the Dragon Fly (Dragon Fly/Pavlova).

In Rhode Island; also in 2010, Capezio® awarded her Brae Crest School with the prestige and \$5000 in scholarship money as the first recipient of Capezio's Studio Connect Award - Scholarship Division. Brae Crest was the only school chosen, nationwide, for their generosity and excellence in ballet training for its community; Ms. Marsden was highlighted in Dance Studio Life Magazine, August 2011 Edition, as Teacher in the Spotlight; September 2, 2013 Ms. Marsden accepted her "Salute to Seniors" citation from Senior Digest and Bankers Life & Casualty Company in recognition of her accomplishments with Brae Crest School and SBRI, and for inspiring people of all ages to strive to reach their goals. Over the 58 years, many of Ms. Marsden's students and company dancers have become prominent figures among the world of dance in the state of Rhode Island, as well as nationally and internationally.

Ms. Marsden continues as Artistic Director and Choreographer for SBRI. She continues teaching at BCSB and is the proud mother of four grown children, Ana, Richard, Mark, and Dujko, and seven grandchildren, Shana, Brandan, Ashley, Ayden, Adela, twins Armin & Adam, and great-grandchildren Anika and Hudson.





## Ana Marsden Fox

#### Alumna Artist Executive Director RESIDENT CHOREOGRAPHER

Over the years, those who have enjoyed performances of The State Ballet have had the additional pleasure of watching the remarkable career of Ana.

Born in Split, Croatia, while her parents, Herci and Myles Marsden were leading members of the Croatian National Theatre, she came with them to the United States when only six months old. Taught by her parents, Ana's ballet training began at Brae Crest School at age two. Her passion and persistent dedication resulted in her rapid promotion within the company. In 1970, Ana toured Croatia with The State Ballet. Later, she was privileged to be accepted at the Royal Ballet School in London, England in 1975. When she returned to Lincoln, she continued performing as a principal dancer with SBRI.

Under the direction of her godfather, the late Sir Anton Dolin, Ana was honored to be chosen by Dolin to dance the role of Grahn in Pas de Quatre, performed for the first time in Rhode Island in 1978. Ana has danced major roles in productions of SBRI and appeared with the Providence Opera Theatre, the Rhode Island Civic Chorale and Orchestra, Atlanta Ballet, and the New England Ballet.

As a choreographer, Ana has also created several ballets for SBRI, most of which were premiers in Rhode Island, and several were supported by competitive RISCA Merit and Fellowship Grant in Choreography awards. Some of these ballets inclue *Ballet Ireland*, *Les Pieds*, *Les* Bras, Goddesses of the Vine, Ballet West, Autumn Leaves, Ballet of the Clowns, Hegnar & Buck, Gansel & Hetal.

Her ballet Petra and the Vuk, based on the story of Peter and the Wolf, Ana used her Slavic influence, choreographing folkloric dance and Harvaski traditional patterns.


In collaboration with SBRI's resident choreographers, Ana enjoyed the premiers of A Midsummer Night's Dream and A Tale of Twelve Dancing Princesses. One of her most favorite ballets was Alice's Adventures in Wonderland inspired by the work of her godfather the late Sir Anton Dolin. Her vision for *Alice* was a dream come true.

Although a dedicated artist, Ana is also a wife, mother and grandmother. She resides in Lincoln, Rhode Island with her husband, Gregory Fox. They have two grown children, Shana and Brandan Cane, and granddaughters Anika and Hudson.



























## SIR ANTON DOLIN

## SBRI Artistic Advisor, Mentor, and Family Friend, 1960-1983

The State Ballet of Rhode Island on April 3rd and 4th, 2020 as part of an established repertoire in honor of the world famous, the late Sir Anton Dolin. Famous for his interpretation in the role of "Albrecht," he choreographed *Giselle* particularly for The State Ballet of Rhode Island in 1964, at which time he performed the role of "Hilarion", claiming "I feel very happy and privileged to be associated with you all in the production of *Giselle*."(RI Premier, 1964).

As a British ballet dancer, director, and choreographer, Dolin was acclaimed throughout the ballet world. He was an excellent teacher and generously coached many young dancers, including the Marsden family. His name was greatly respected for his knowledge of the traditions in the ballet world. Anton Dolin, who aided Herci & Myles Marsden to perfect their *Giselle*, was one of Diaghilev's major dancers, as was George Balanchine.

Other ballets that Dolin contributed to SBRI are the *Don Quixote Pas de Deux* in 1960, the *Pas de Quatre* in 1976, which successfully evokes the gracious period of the romantic ballet of the 19th century.

## Founding Premieur Danseur and Artistic Director/Choreographer of The State Ballet of Rhode Island, 1960-1976

#### IN THE CLASSICAL TRADITION

The dance technique being taught and performed in Rhode Island by Herci and Myles Marsden has a tradition that goes back 200 years to Jean Georges Noverre, the first choreographer. Noverre taught Gaetan Vestris, who taught his son, Auguste, and so on through the 19th century, when such figures as Marius Pepita led the tradition. Classical ballet emerged dramatically in 1909 when the Russian impressario Diaghilev brought the Ballet Russe to Paris, with such legendary dancers as Pavlova and Nijinsky. All of the teachers who have played an important role in the Marsdens' early development were leading figures with Diaghilev during the 20 years he dominated the scene. Nicholas Legat was his choreographer, and Ana Roje and Anton Dolin his proteges.



#### FROM EUROPE TO AMERICA

That the ethereal beauty and drama of classical ballet could be more than a dream for Rhode Islanders is due itself to a dream, a dream of a native son. At the age of 16, Myles Marsden went to England to audition for Anton Dolin. On Dolin's recommendation he was accespted to the famous Legat School. While there, he alone of sixty students was chosen to attend the International Ballet School in Split, Yugoslavia. Under the guardianship of its founders, renowned choreographer Oskar Harmos and Ana Roje, prima ballerina of the Yugoslav National Ballet, Myles studied, performed, and grew in technique. He became the first American graduate of the school and rose from corps de ballet to premier danseur of the Yugoslav National Ballet.

It was there he met and married Herci Munitic, an exquisite soloist with the company. The Marsdens, with their baby daughter, Ana, returned to America and made an important career choice: to devote themselves to teaching rather than just performing with a major dance company. Thus in 1958, Brae Crest School of Ballet was founded. The Marsdens were deteremined to maintain the standards of the classical Russian ballet and to develop dancers of professional caliber.

In 1958, Dorothy Alexander, director of Atlantic Civic Ballet, and Anatole Chuoy, founder and editor of Dance News, devoted themselves in creationg a regional dance movement. Because of this, the Marsdens were inspired to create Rhode Island's first established civic regional ballet company, founded in 1960.




## RICHARD ANTON MARSDEN

### SBRI Honorary Artistic Advisor, 2018-Present

Richard Marsden made his onstage debut at the early age of six. He acquired his early training under the tutelage of his parents at the Brae Crest School of Classical Ballet in Lincoln, RI. At the age of 12, he was awarded a scholarship to the prestigious School of American Ballet in New York. He attained a year-round full scholarship when he was fifteen years of age. Three years later, Richard joined the New York City Ballet. Richard danced the Repertory of George Balanchine, Jerome Robbins and Peter Martins, and was met with a unanimous wave of adulation from the critics. In 1988, he made his debut as the Cavalier in Balanchine's "Nutcracker." He was also featured in Martin's "Les Petits Riens," "Les Gentilhommes," "Black and White," and as Blue Bird in "The Sleeping Beauty." Additionally, Richard performed extensively in the repertory of Jerome Robbins, including "Fanfare," "Glass Pieces," "The Four Seasons," "West Side Story Suite," "Goldberg Variations," "Ives Songs," "I'm Old Fashioned," "The Concert," and "Brandenburg."

Furthermore, his incredible talents as a performer led Richard to appear as a Premier Dancer and Guest Artist with several ballet companies throughout the world. In essence, Richard has made his ambition to supply the world with a universal understanding of the masculine figure in ballet. He looks forward to continuing performing and sharing his talents as a respected Instructor and Ballet Master.





In addition to Richard's accomplishments with the New York City Ballet, he has also performed a vast repertory of original and contemporary works to a wealth of critical acclaim.

His talents have brought him to work with today's top choreographers, including Val Caniparoli, Trey MacIntyre, Helgi Tomasson, Dwight Rhoden, Septime Weber, Alan Hineline, Gary Masters, and Christopher Stowell.

In performance, he was also featured as an American Star during a two week tour to Russia, where Richard received standing ovations at every performance in the 6,000 seat Kremlin Palace Theater in Moscow.

Most recently, Richard's performances with the Sacramento Ballet garnered him his most outstanding praise to date; "Ballet lover's who saw Richard Marsden's scintillating performance of the tortured Hamlet during Thursday's opening night performance of the Sacramento Ballet's 'Hamlet, Hemlines and More' program now realize how lucky we are" (Patricia Beech Smith, Sacramento Bee).

Currently exemplifying a history of excellence, Richard is faculty member and master coach at Ballet Arts Center for Dance, continuing the legacy of his godfather Sir Anton Dolin.






















### SBRI RESIDENT CHOREOGRAPHERS

#### SHANA FOX MARCEAU



Shana, a Lincoln native, has grown up at Brae Crest. She joined SBRI in 1990 progressing throughout the company ranks. Shana received her BA in Communication from the University of New Hampshire (2001) where she danced and choreographed for the UNH Dance Company. For SBRI, Shana has created such works as Summertime, Lift Me Up (2010), and Deco (2017), and premiered several collaborative-choreographer pieces like Gracefully Gershwin (2009), A Midsummer Night's Dream (2015), and The Colors of Love & Light (2019). In 2011, Shana restaged a 1981 SBRI repertoire ballet, Impressions of the Sky, which was originally created by her grandmother, Herci Marsden. Born in Providence, RI, Mark began taking classes under the direction of his mother, Herci Marsden, as soon as he was able to walk! After receiving extensive training at the Brae Crest School of Classical Ballet, Mark joined The State Ballet in 1984 as an apprentice, learning as much of the company's corps de ballet repertoire as possible. In 1985, Mark was promoted to Company member, partnering many female dancers, and was promoted to a Soloist dancer shortly thereafter. As Mark's hard work in the company increased, he was seen dancing many pas de deux and solo male variations. By 1992, Mark was promoted to Principal dancer and given the opportunity to dance the role of "Frantz" in *Coppélia* for the first time. In the spring of 1996, Mark was specially chosen to dance a lead role in Two's Company for guest choreographer, Toni Pimble of The Eugene Ballet Company, Oregon. Audiences have enjoyed Mark's performances in many leading roles such as "Prince Desire" (The Sleeping Beauty), "Head Cadet" (Graduation Ball), "Albrecht" (Giselle), and "Lead Cowboy" in Ballet West, just to name a few.

Mark has amazingly partnered nearly every leading lady in SBRI's history. This long-time commitment and loyalty lead to Mark's recognition for all of his contributions to The State Ballet of RI with one of the first 'Partner With The Arts' Awards ever given in May of 2004. 




## SBRI ALUMNUS GUEST ARTIST Professor William Kilroy

The Narragansett Times did a cover story that year, with the headline: "Kilroy Comes Home to Dance." That dancing began when William took ballet classes from Ms. Marsden while a theatre major at URI. Prior to his first performance as "Dr. Coppélius," William was thrilled to have been able to confer with the incomparable Sir Anton Dolin at a meeting in New York City.

William is honored to have performed with Herci Marsden, Ana Marsden Fox, Barbara DeVivo, and so many other wonderful "Swanhilda"s through the years. Yes, there were a few missed years while William was working as an actor in Los Angeles, but it has been literally decades that William has had the joy of performing with the beloved company that is The State Ballet of Rhode Island. Meanwhile, William has worked nationally as an actor and director, including roles such as "Steve" in Becky's New Car, "Michael" in Tony 'n Tina's Wedding and "Laertes" in Hamlet. TV appearances include As the World Turns, All My Children, Babylon Five, and commercials.



Wil's directing credits range from Nunsense to Don't Ask, Don't Tell - an original presentation which was devised with the cast, and his productions of A Midsummer Night's Dream, The Laramie Project, and Purple Breasts were all chosen to perform at the Kennedy Center's American College Theatre Festivals. Purple Breasts, a play about one woman's journey through breast cancer, was presented at several additional venues, including at the National Breast Care Conference in Washington, D.C.

William was part of a cultural exchange which entailed teaching and directing in Mytilene on the island of Lesvos, Greece, and he taught in London for several summers. As the co-founder of the National Michael Chekhov Association, along with actress and executrix of Michael Chekhov's estate, the late Mala Powers, William has taught workshops all over the country, in venues ranging from Loyola Marymount University to Bowling Green University, and at various national conferences. William has been a workshop presenter and participated as an actor/director annually for the New Play Development Program at the national conference of the Association for Theatre in Higher Education. William is former New England Chair of the Kennedy Center's American College Theatre Festival, and was awarded the Kennedy Center bronze medallion for achievement in Theatre Education in 2014. Wil has also served as the chair of the New England Theatre Conference.

Wil is the recipient of the Moss Hart Award, the Maine Education Association's Human and Civil Rights Award, an acting scholarship for study with Uta Hagen, USM's Advisor award, and USM's Outstanding Teacher/Scholar Award, and holds Professor Emeritus Status at the University of Southern Maine. Currently William is the Department Head of Theatre Arts at New Mexico State University and is the Managing Director of the American Southwest Theatre Company in residence there. This summer William appeared in a new play, Weighing *In*, at the Black Box Theatre of Las Cruces, NM. However, his favorite performing is playing "Dr. Coppélius" in the SBRI annual production of Marsden's Coppélia.
